Summary of recent information for Chichester South

Several reports of noise nuisance and ASB – including a party of young people noisy and drinking, 2 noisy vehicles, young children shouting all day

Fly tipping – although the tip is open for the public, it seems that people are still not taking their rubbish to be disposed of properly, I have spoken to people on this issue and some seem to think that West Sussex has made it complicated and expensive to dispose of rubbish in the correct way. Obviously this does not excuse dumping rubbish in any way but might explain some of it. There are also some gardens full of rubbish in local properties, some of which are housing association property and have been reported

Drugs Issues – There are possibly some new issues in the Canal area to be looked at.

Toilets – The town centre toilet facilities have been an arson target so need looking at more often

A nasty incident of an elderly disabled lady being frightened by a young woman while on her way home. There was not the evidence to solve this case but I have been in contact with her and hope she will contact me if she needs anything at all, even just a chat.

And lastly I just wanted to say that the mosaics around the Whyke Oval bandstand have been removed by CDC as they were in such bad condition they were dangerous. It's a shame that they won't be replaced but in the present climate other things have to take priority. Maybe when things have improved another project could be arranged with the local school for some replacements

City Council Report November 2020

Chichester West

Here is a short roundup of incidents I have dealt with:

- Ongoing, a neighbour dispute that has been causing a lot of concerns involving: anti-social behaviour, damage to property, rodent infestation. Waiting on information/action from Hyde
- Attending referrals made to Community Hub of vulnerable residents in need of help. Three vulnerable people in particular who have needed lots of support and advice.
- Reassurance calls to elderly and vulnerable residents.
- Three incidents of graffiti, now removed.
- Numerous fly posters removed.
- Fly tipping reported to Hyde for removal. Possibly liaising with Hyde for an 'amnesty day' where a skip can be arranged and residents can get rid of their unwanted items in a more responsible way.
- Referred three people for Christmas Rotary vouchers and one to the Mayor's Hardship Fund for people in need of help.
- Assisted Police with Op Shine event in Chichester to encourage use of correct cycle lights and also bike security marking.
- Hi vis patrols of area on Halloween.
- Concerns about a homeless couple living in a tent. Info sent to Homeless Outreach officer and the couple are now accessing help for housing.
- Attending the market on Weds and Saturdays to ensure Covid guidelines are being observed.
- Two incidents of vehicles in a damaged condition being left on public highway for long periods. I managed to find out the registered owner of a flat bed truck and spoke to him. It was causing some obstruction to flow of traffic. He got it towed away a few days later. The other vehicle had been left in a quiet road for some time, but was taxed and insured so I couldn't get it removed. I contacted Parking Services who issued fixed penalty notices.

Community Wardens report for Chichester City

Well we are in another lockdown again, but it doesn't feel as severe as the previous one we had. Last week between Monday – Wednesday we were extremely in the city shopping wise, as people were obviously trying to get as much Christmas shopping in as they can. This meant we had a lot of shoplifters around especially on Wednesday where I attended 4 different incidents within an hour. As we are in lock down now shoplifting has dropped considerably.


There has been a significant drop in begging for due to lockdown although we still have a gentleman on Monsoon property who is begging, the police are aware, so are our Rough sleeper engagement team who have been actively engaging with him. We also have quite a low number of rough sleepers in the city at the thanks to our rough sleeper outreach team and all the other agencies and charities.

Although ASB has dropped in the city we are still getting it in certain areas especially round the ADC car park, I do a fortnightly multi agency patrol with the police and the college, to give advice and to disrupt ASB. At the moment the police have Directed Patrol Activity on the ADC car park to support this.

Bicycles continue to be a problem on North and East Street although it has tapered off since the summer because of the weather. I recently was involved in Operation Shine which is advising cyclists to use bicycle lights as it get darker in the mornings and evenings. We were also security bike marking at The Cross and marked approximately 30 bikes. Something that started to creep in during the summer is the illegal riding of electric scooters both on the road and footpath. I have been giving advice to individuals who both to stop on this, though a lot of people think they are legal to ride. My manager with the help of the police has designed a leaflet to give out to individuals to give them advice.

Friends of Chartres Report for Community Affairs Meeting November 19 2020

Our attempts to re-launch our programme have come to a temporary halt due to the second lockdown this month. For the foreseeable future, events will take place on Zoom.

Events

Members met on October 22 in the Coffee Bar at the Festival Theatre. This was a popular event as it gave members the first opportunity to meet in person since March.

A quiz on Zoom is planned for November 24, and a further coffee morning has been pencilled in for December 15 - assuming we are out of lockdown by then. We are also experimenting with a monthly Heure Apéro, where members of the Friends of Chartres will meet members of the Amis de Chichester on-line, exchange news and raise a glass to each other.

2021

As we are not sure what lies ahead, we are only planning four months ahead rather than for a full year. From January to April, we are planning a couple of lectures to be delivered by Zoom, and a virtual dinner. This will be provided by Field and Fork, who will put on a French themed menu for us, which members can collect and consume at home - hopefully in groups if we are allowed to meet in each other's homes by then.

Annual Exchange

Our annual exchange, which was due to take place in April this year has been postponed to April 2021. It remains to be seen what the restrictions are at the time and whether the anti-COVID vaccine will be widely available enough to allow us to travel.

Conversation groups

We continued to meet in person during September and October and are now meeting on Zoom. As our meetings are now on-line, we have been able to invite people from Chartres to participate - which is very good for our French. We learnt from them that the rules governing lockdown in France are much stricter than here.

Citylink

Two new editors, Rosie Speer and Ellen Haigh, took on the task of producing our regular Newsletter, Citylink. The first edition went out in September and was very well received.
