What steps are needed to prepare a neighbourhood plan?

These are the steps needed to prepare neighbourhood plan:

- 1. Defining the neighbourhood area agreeing the plan boundary
- 2. Drafting the plan research, engagement, drafting policy text etc.
- 3. Formal min. 6-week consultation (Reg.14) run by the parish council on a draft of the whole plan
- 4. Consider revisions and changes based on the results of the Reg. 14 consultation
- 5. Submission to Chichester District Council once the plan is updated
- 6. Formal min. 6-week consultation (Reg. 16) run by the local planning authority
- 7. Independent examination to check against the regulations
- 8. Referendum final plan is voted upon by local people
- 9. Plan comes into legal force if the referendum is won




1. The Organiser

The key skills you will need are being organised generally, being able to think about how long certain tasks will take, being able to suggest who is the best person or people to complete these tasks and how to oversee the delivery of the tasks.



2. The Researcher & Analyst

Maybe you are somebody with an interest in culture and history or architecture and can make connections between the design of a building, the context in which it was built and how it is used today? Or perhaps you enjoy walking around and soaking up the general atmosphere, just "people watching". Well, now is the time to take those people watching skills and ask some deeper questions.



3. The Facts & Stats Person

You work quite differently to the two types of people previously. You are somebody who needs to deal with the facts, what you see in front of you. Your research will underpin the evidence needed for the writing of the neighbourhood plan as your work will help ground the more poetic aspects of place with accurate data.



4. The Engager

You will focus on talking to the public. This is the third part of the research process: The Researcher & Analyst identifies themes and threads that reveal the big picture and the Facts & Stats person grounds these ideas and presents some robust evidence. Now, the Engager tests these emerging theories out on the public.



5. The Presenter

The job of the Presenter is to oversee the work and understand the evolving process. The presentation element involves combining photographs, diagrams, maps, plans and other illustrations with text. The results from the Researcher & Analyst, the Facts & Stats person and the Engager will all be fed towards the Presenter who will package and assemble the work into a coherent and compelling story.



Summersdale

Summersdale is considered a green and leafy neighbourhood.



The footpaths around the fields and countryside are quite a community hub.



Signs and street furniture are probably about right,



East Broyle



Entirely residential.



The village green on the entrance holds events and is used for picnics, football, running, dog walking. sunbathing etc.



Large plot sizes make the area desirable. Extensions are popular. They add variety but reduce open areen space.

The Pallants



* 🦍 There are some significant views which need to be preserved. Most important amongst these are the view of the cathedral looking along West Pallant.



The built environment is generally of good quality and is entirely urban in the and is entirely urban in character. Virtually all of the buildings in the Pallants are listed.



It is perceived as the heart of the city and there are often guided tours of the Pallants.

West Walls



Organic growth and natural change over the centuries have ensured a good land mix in the area.



The lack of front gordens a strong feature.



There is a well-placed and very well used bench on the north side of the roundabout.



The area is well served for cultural venues.

Westgate



One of the major attractions of Westgate is the leafy character of the neighbourhood.



The diversity of family dwellings with their well-established aardens adds see 15

New Park Road Area



There is a good mix of older and new buildings sensitively designed to fit in with the character of the

Arun Park Estate



Norence Park (just to the west of Arun Park estate) is a very useful resource for the eastern edge of the city. It is well used with a good range of equipment.



The old and attractive reception building to the south of Arun Park Estate could be kept when this area is developed as a residential area and become a community centre.

Newtown



Newtown is an attractive urban, mainly historic landscape with a mix of styles and sizes. It is enhanced by mature trees.



There are alleyways and arches in Newtown and the Pallants that provide interest.



Many visitors examine the houses carefully and can often be heard saying "... isn't it lovely here?"

PLACE Analysis Key Messages / September 2021

Summersdale

Cycle and walk ways could be signposted better.



Roads and footpaths could be better maintained.



East Broyle



Crossing roads within the estate is safe and easy but St Pauls Rd not so much.



The open plan design is being spoilt by hedging to enclose gardens.



Redesign the junction at the entrance to Norwich Road. It can be difficult to get out of the estate. Add a pedestrian and cycle crossing.

The Pallants



Restrictions for commercial vehicles would be helpful.



At times there has in the past been considerable noise from the pubs in South Street.



* 🖍 Apart from the walls walk all remaining areas of open space are all surfaced with tarmac which give little pleasure to the senses.

West Walls



* 👠 Brewery Field needs to be more accessible and integrated into the street scene. It is currently bodly underused.



Make the new roundabout "extra special" as a contemporary portal to the Cathedral and a statement of quality re the city.



Orchard Street is not suited to its traffic levels. Reduce troffic with a city bypass which works.

Westgate




The Old Tannery Site area is unused and unsightly. An appropriate redevelopment of this in appropriate redevelopment of this site would be a significant improvement.



The paving needs to be restored in keeping with character of the Conservation Area.



The volume and speed of traffic along Westgate has been an ongoing concern for residents in the area.



New Park Road Area



At night time drunken revellers from the pubs makes the area alona East St and New Park Road car park feel unsafe.



Pedestrian and cycling routes and safety need



Lighting needs some thought. The very bright lights in New Park car park is very disturbing to local residents. However, the path along the East Wall is very dark at night and would benefit from being brighter.

Arun Park Estate



Arun Park Estate has no community building.



There is need for a pedestrian crossing from Royal Close (elderly/sheltered housing) to the Co-Op on Boanor Road.



Over time some of the play areas have become less well used and some areas have a slightly neglected feel to them.

Newtown



There have been problems with strong smells and waste collection from restaurants and there are many unsightly air conditioning heat exchangers on commercial properties.



Visitors have trouble finding landmarks and buildings they want to visit.



Pavements and road surfaces are poorly maintained.

Access from the railway station to the city is poor, it is not an

It is perceived as the scruffy end of the city but that is because people do not know the cul-de-sac street patterns.



Stockbridge Road and Kingsham Road are busy "rat run" roads. By becoming a low traffic neighbourhood (LTN) the area would not be influenced so heavily by traffic movements.



There is not enough space at the Canal Basin to cope with the increased use.

Whyke



The A27 causes noise and pollution issues.



The candle factory causes a nuisance because of unpleasant smells.



Parking restrictions lead to increased traffic speeds as there are no parked cars to slow the traffic. But street parking causes bad visibility. This makes crossing danaerous.


ACTION POINTS

- 1. We need a task group to start to review the PLACE results so far and then begin to <u>research</u> and draft an initial policy response to the opportunities and challenges i.e. what do we protect and what do we improve? Our team will support this work.

As very important members of the community, we want to ask <u>you</u> some questions. You might like to work with a friend and interview each other? Please write and draw your answers in the boxes below.




Just three selected examples of the creative contributions from the school children, describing in drawings and text how they would like to improve Cirencester.




