January 2022

Hello all, we hope you've had a great Christmas and that you're in good health.

Covid is restricting from attending home visits and meetings, unless they are absolutely essential. We need to keep ourselves, residents and colleagues as safe as possible.

Fly tipping has been at its usual levels. The same goes for Graffiti.

E-Scooters are an issue in all Warden Areas. We have given advice/warnings to people using them on the Streets and Footpaths. Any complaints we receive we refer them to the Police.

We have had a report of parking issues in The Peacheries. Notes were left on cars, and people were shouted at, and given abuse by residents. Advice was given to report incidents of this abuse to the Police and that people should continue to park legally and within local restrictions. The main perpetrator has been identified in this long standing matter.

We have had reports of scam emails and we have given advice on how to report them.

A Neighbour dispute in Whyke re noise may be linked to Mental Health issues.

Doors are being knocked and kicked in Whyke and Kingsham, one door was believed to have been kicked in. We will continue to monitor.

Arundel Park: an address has been given to us relating to ASB and Drug dealing. RSL and Police are aware. We will continue to monitor.

The Charles Avenue Hub Community Engagement project has been difficult to get off the ground. There has been a lack of take up by the residents, whilst Covid is also partly to blame. We, as a part of the multi-agency team, are rethinking the strategy behind this, but we may need to wait for calmer waters before proceeding.

Swanfield: ASB is ongoing. We received a report of two individuals being attacked by a group of young people. It was a third party report and attempts

have been made to contact them. We will continue to monitor. A SPRING clean up of the green area was well attended.

Another incident of suspected drug taking has been discovered in Florence Park following several syringes being found in one of the toilet cubicles. Further to this a third party report of drug dealing in the area was received. We will continue to monitor.

We continue to support the 3rd yr Uni Students with the Forest School Project at Rumboldswhyke School. So far we have supplied 12 wooden pallets and 7 tyres.

Community Warden City report January 2022

Happy New Year to everybody, it has been an interesting few months, generally the build up to Christmas normally is. During the last couple of months I have been working very closely with the police on Operation Tinsel which has been mainly targeting shoplifting and pick pocketing as well as any other crime that occurs in the city. This operation was highly successful both in catching and deterring crime, as well as giving the public reassurance and peace of mind to be able to shop safely in Chichester city by having a high number of multi-agency uniformed patrols in the city.

Begging seemed to increase over this period as well, which is normally the case round Christmas time. Working with the BID and Rough sleeper outreach team, we were able to put CDC's diverted giving posters into shops, especially those that were popular begging spots to make members of the public aware that they could donate their money to local charities who directly help all of our rough sleepers in the city. I am aware that the majority of the rough sleepers who were begging over the Christmas period were accommodated.

The Multi story car park is beginning to attract more anti-social behaviour again. I am coming across a lot of young individuals smoking cannabis in this area. Due to this the multi-agency ASB walk round has been scaled back up again with some good success. The police are patrolling the area more frequently now due to local intelligence.

Graffiti has been quite prevalent in the city, it seems to be mainly tagging, we get a cluster of the same taggers over the city, Piers and I clean them off it goes quiet for a little while and it starts up again. We had a clean just before Christmas and I noticed the day I got back that they have gone round again over the Christmas period and targeted electrical boxes and phone boxes and now seem to be all over the city unfortunately the council can only remove tags on property it owns and unfortunately a lot of it is on private property too which would mean it would be up to the property owner to clean off.

The Anti-vax stickers seemed to have stopped after most of the restrictions were lifted, then the government announced compulsory face mask wearing in shops and then somebody kindly went round and put more stickers on shops in all four streets and I noticed more yesterday, if they weren't challenging enough to remove them they are now becoming bigger and harder to remove, but I will endeavour to remove as much of it as I can.

I am still working very closely with the Rough Sleeping Outreaching team and Stonepillow especially with regards to when people go missing or if there are concerns for someone, as I am out and about and would more than likely no them or where they would hang out, I am normally the first port of call.

Here is a short roundup of incidents and issues dealt with. Not too much to report this time as I was away on leave over Christmas/New Year period:

- Neighbour disputes: some complex issues in one location. What began as a problem with a neighbour's unkempt garden has now evolved into getting help and assistance for a vulnerable resident.
- Parking issues
- Continual problems with rubbish and fly tipping at a particular area. As fast as it's cleared away, a minority of residents leave their rubbish and unwanted household items around the bin areas once again.
- Day burning streetlights reported
- Reassurance and welfare visits and phone contact to combat loneliness and isolation.
- Information and advice to family with elderly lady suffering from dementia. Details on Sage House passed on.
- Suspected drug activity in one location reported to me just before Christmas will follow up for more info to pass to relevant agency.
- Elderly resident had damage to a shed that was subsequently found to contain asbestos. Environmental Health informed.
- Group of young teenage boys causing anti-social behaviour/damage/bullying around the area. After some enquiries I found out names/addresses/schools attended. Info passed onto relevant authorities for action. Encouraged residents to report all incidents to Police.

We do however intend to hold our annual dinner for the first time for two years at the 64 restaurant and bar at Chichester College on 17th February.


