City centre Community Wardens report August 2024

With the hotter weather the cities populous has increased as expected with visitors here for their holidays. As always with warmer weather anti-social behaviour increases mainly there seems to be more frequent gatherings of the street community in certain areas of the city mainly Eastgate Square and the Cathedral Green. I spend a lot of my day targeting problem areas and highlighting theses areas and offending individuals to the police. There has been a drop however of student age related anti-social behaviour in most part in the city, probably due to the school holidays. Although we have had quite a few incidents of criminal damage in Priory Park toilets which we are monitoring and have been reported to the police.

Cycling in prohibited areas in the city remains a constant, it seems lower in average and a drop in E-scooters as well. Although we have had appearances of electric motorbikes which are clearly been ridden illegally, I have reported these instances to police immediately.

The multi-storey car park is still getting sporadic incidents of vandalism and graffiti, but at the moment the smoking of cannabis in the area has dropped significantly due to the summer holidays.

Shop lifting remains an issue in the city, a lot of shops are now increasing security measures especially updating CCTV in their shops which seems to be having an impact, however even with a lot of encouragement from myself and other agencies, there still seems to be a lot of under reporting of these thefts to the police, which means the police are unaware how much thefts go on a daily basis.

Rough sleeping, begging and graffiti has been quite low at the moment compared to previous months.

It has been a busy few months, but here is a brief overview:

- Various events/fundraising attended in the community Residents Association, local churches, community get togethers etc.
- Quite a few training/refresher courses completed including dementia awareness, conflict resolution, countering radical extremism.
- Assisting with General Election vote counts, both postal and overnight.
- Four ongoing neighbour disputes involving anti-social behaviour, noise, environmental problems, housing. I am offering support and welfare checks.
- UK Harvest events attended giving advice, help and support to struggling households. Help with cost of living advice and signposting to various agencies. UK Harvest have recently changed from weekly to fortnightly, but the Residents Association and I are trialling a 'drop in' social event on the weeks the Pantry doesn't run to enable residents to still get together for refreshments and social interaction. This will run until the end of September to see how it goes.
- Talks on the latest scams and advice about cycling rules through the pedestrian areas of Chichester.
- Numerous faulty streetlights, pot holes and grafitti reported for removing.
- Welfare visits to elderly residents who have been in hospital/waiting for operations. Welfare visits to disabled resident. Helped an elderly lady to complete an extremely long and complex Attendance Allowance application.
- Other issues dealt with illegal parking, advice given to a resident (not in my area but who called me) about noisy neighbours and untidy front gardens filled with broken children's toys and gazebo equipment. Advice about food banks. Problems and complaints about increased numbers of electric scooters on the roads and pavements. Traveller incursions.
- Once a week cover for Bracklesham and East/West Wittering. Assistance given with two lost dogs, advice on abandoned vehicles, advice on neighbour problems and rubbish. Reassuring and explaining to as many people as I could about what to do/who to contact now their Community Warden has sadly passed away. I will be continuing this until further notice.

Dog left in car in a hot car park, owner sought out and advice given.


We attended the Fun Day on Swanfield Park and the Play Day on Florence Park which was very well attended.



Friends of Ravenna Report for the Chichester Community Affairs meeting on Monday 2 September 2024

Programme of Events 2023-24

The AGM was held on 13th June. Members agreed to changing the annual membership period so that it runs from 1 July of one year to 30 June of the following year and also to changing to individual membership rather than single / family membership. We participated in the annual '4 Cities' event on Monday, 24th June, a very successful evening with guest speaker Tom Brown, Head Gardener at West Dean Gardens. The Chichester Gala on Saturday, 29th August was a great venture with all 4 twinning organisations presenting together their part in making Chichester a "Europe-facing" city. Many stopped to learn about what we do, participated in the games / puzzles provided and took away copies of our magazines and the well-presented leaflet on twinning in Chichester. The weather helped!

Programme of Events 2024-25

The Programme Card for the year starting in September 2024 has gone out to Members and we are looking forward to welcoming speakers to talk about travel, music, art, films, science, design and sport. At our first meeting on Monday, 9th September we will have the honour of hosting the Amici di Chichester's President, Livia Caprara.

Developments

The planned **music exchange** took at the end of July. Six students accompanied by Jon Grave (Chichester University) were very warmly welcomed in Ravenna. Feedback from the participating students and from Jon Grave was extremely positive. Their generous and enthusastic Italian hosts made the visit very special and plans are already afoot for a reciprocal music exchange to Chichester in 2025, possibly in June.

Plans for the installation of Philip Jackson's sculpture of Dante ('Dante Searching for Paradise') on Wednesday, 11th September are in the final stages! Guests at the ceremony will include Hugh Bonneville, Livia Caprara (President of Amici di Chichester), the Headmaster, Head Boy and Head Girl of Midhurst Rother College, author Greta Sykes and a representative of the Italian Cultural Institue in London and of course members of Midhurst Town Council, The Midhurst Society and Friends of Ravenna who are all acknowledged as contributors to the project.

Our **twinning trip** to Ravenna will take place this time 18-22 September when 15 of us will visit the city, many of us for the first time.

As one of the outcomes of the Dante Project, a short course on Italian Language & Culture will be available at Midhurst Rother College. Conversations during the Chichester Gala and in other settings would seem to indicate that some kind of interaction with **schools in Chichester** would be welcomed, scoping the work of twinning (Chartres, Ravenna, Speyer & Valletta) and envisioning the younger generation.

The Friends of Speyer express our thanks to the City Council for organising a super Gala event and we are very conscious of how much advance preparation of such events is needed and the organisational challenges en route. There was universal agreement that the 'European Village' concept worked really well and can be consolidated in future years.

At present, our membership stands around the 80 mark (we are chasing up some non payers and we have some interest post the two July events).

We have now ramped up publicity about the Friends of Speyer in the Chichester Observer with a news article and an item in the Clubs and Societies section of the newspaper. We have an excellent website developed by Sarah Martin and her husband, and have established of our Facebook page. Our Executive Committee on 12th August was lively and productive. A number of good suggestions have been made for what I regard as 'Phase 2' of our operations. Developing links with local schools is still a somewhat of an uphill challenge.

Date: 22nd August 2024

Since we last reported (27th May 2024), Chichester Tree Wardens' volunteer activities to promote trees and encourage protection of and planting trees include:

- A regular watering regime has been established with **Parklands** Residents' Association to ensure the community's trees at Sherborne Road recreation ground (planted 1st March 2024) are given the care they need to thrive. PRA's volunteer tree-watering team, supported by having access to CDC's water supply at the changing pavilion, gives confidence that these young trees will establish well.
- We supported Friends of St Mary's Churchyard's Family and Community Day on Saturday 8th June as part of Love Your Burial Ground Week, providing a stall with tree-related information and a Tree Spotters' Challenge, based on observation of and research into the trees in this churchyard off Whyke Road.
- Our Art in the Park event on 4th July at Oaklands Park saw a steady trickle of visitors to, and conversation at, our information stall, alongside Fiona Bell Currie's art workshop, as part of the Festival of Chichester, and a mini tree trail through the community orchard. The event was sponsored by Fiona, and venue thanks to permission from Chichester Festival Theatre.
- Also part of the Festival, Explore Trees (in Priory Park) on 10th July was fully booked, although it clashed with England's football semi-final and actual attendance was a mixture of booked places and people who turned up. Over 20 people were divided into 2 groups to look at and talk about trees, mostly from the vantage point of the City walls, during an early evening walk lasting just over an hour. Attendees were a mixture of locals and visitors, and we are grateful to Chichester Quakers for sponsoring this event, including the use of the Friends Meeting House. We found the format worked well and hope to offer more tree walk-and-talk events in different parts of the city next year.
- We have been involved with tree planting discussions for Florence Park with CDC and a keen member of the public, hoping to take advantage of CDC's work with DEFRA on tree planting schemes.
- Progress with our <u>ChiTrees</u> tree recording project has been slow, as volunteer time has been constrained. We will do what we can.
- We have not yet received the updated **Chichester City Centre Tree Trail** from WSCC for printing. A further tree on the Trail has been felled (Foxglove tree in Tower Close, TT28) and another is under threat (False Acacia, TT29, at WSCC's Northleigh House, Tower Street). We endeavour to review and comment on all Trees in a Conservation Area Notices, through the Chichester Conservation

Area Advisory Committee, but the system can do nothing to require replacement trees to be planted, and will not require trees to be retained when their stability is in doubt.

• A **site compound** for road works connected to Phase 1 development at Whitehouse Farm has been established on Prebendal School's playing fields. It falls outside of both WSCC highway approval and CDC planning approval systems and risks damage to the root systems of trees bordering the compound on its north and west. CDC has been asked to make a Tree Preservation Order; if it does so, at least replacement trees could be required, if these trees decline and fail.

The steady trickle of "I'm worried about this tree"/"do you know what's happening with this tree?"/"can you help with?" type communications continues from people who've become aware we exist through our various outreach activities, including social media, website and events/publicity. Whilst it is great to be made aware, we also try to equip people to follow up concerns and interests for themselves. To this end, we now have a "Useful Links" A5 flyer and web page.

Pests and Diseases

- The oldest tree in <u>Bishops Palace Garden</u>, a circa 350-year-old box tree on the City Walls above Avenue de Chartres, was seen to have been defoliated by **box moth**. We contacted CDC, as Garden managers, and volunteer experts from the <u>European Boxwood and Topiary Society</u> to help consider a long-term strategy for this tree. The likely prognosis is that it will be felled, whilst the wood remains in good condition so that the timber can be celebrated through use for high-end musical instruments (recorders). CDC currently treats the c15-year-old box hedges in the Garden for the moth, but with several broods per year, may need to consider replacing them with a different plant.
- <u>Dutch elm disease</u> flares up every 20 years or so, with the disease-carrying elm bark beetle attracted to trees only when they reach a certain stature. In this latest outbreak, we can see dead elms in local hedgerows, e.g. alongside Westgate (western end), St Paul's Road, Terminus Road, Quarry Lane, and even at Northgate car park. These trees regenerate from suckers produced by their roots, so it's important to manage the land around them to let the next generation of trees grow.
- Anecdotally, a wider variety of trees than usual seem to be showing stress this year than in
 previous years, and we don't know why. Planes seem to have recovered well after losing their first
 flush of leaves to cold; the canopies of ash trees in Chichester are generally not looking as bad as
 feared when ash dieback first emerged; but a scattering of prunus and hawthorn trees have lost
 their leaves, bringing their survival into doubt. In Priory Park, both a mature cedar and a newly
 planted one are looking sick. At Rew Lane, one of the protected Redwoods seems to have died.
 Unpredictable weather patterns may be part of the cause, but it reminds us that trees are living
 things, relying both on their above ground and below ground structures to thrive, and more prone
 to ailments when stressed. We will look out for explanations of what is happening in our efforts to
 spot risks and opportunities for the city.

Coming Up

We have been invited to the screening of "**Heart of an Oak**" at Chichester Cinema at New Park on Monday evening, 9th September to answer questions in the bar afterwards on local trees and how to help with their preservation. Details of the film/how to book can be found <u>here</u>. It is part of a "Greener

Screen" series that is a collaboration between Transition Chichester and the Cinema to showcase environmental themes through film.

Finally, it is with great sadness I report the death of one of our newest volunteers, Zoe FitzGeraldBeckett. I have also received the resignation of longstanding Chichester Tree Warden, Geoff King, who is taking the difficult decision to step back from many of his commitments. News of both was received this week, and we will be taking time to reflect on how we celebrate, record and thank our volunteers for their contributions.
