Chichester City Community Warden report for February 2025

Having only started last month its been a whirlwind tour of the city and I have lots to learn! I am sure I will get to know you all over the coming weeks and months and look to build on the excellent work of my predecessor, I hope I can do him justice and serve you all as well as he did?

We have dealt with and reported several instances of both offensive and general Graffiti across the city over the last few months. We hope with our continued persistence we can limit the amount being seen.

We continue to work in conjunction with West Sussex CC and Chichester City Council alerting them to insecure buildings and criminal damage this hasn't increased in the last 2 months which is good news

We have had issues in priory park with regards to an empty building we are working with estates to try and keep this secure. We also found bollards not in place and this was also reported to our parks department to action.

We have removed fly posting in the city after a report from the BID manager and reported a dangerous bit of the pavement.

We have met every BID and ChiBac members over the last few months and will continue to visit stores over the coming weeks.

We have stopped and spoken to 10-15 cyclists reminding them of the rules around cycling in the city.

We continue to engage the street community around the city and eastgate square visitors, shops in that area have been visited and will be spoken to on a regular basis.

City Council Report March 2025 Chichester East and Whyke

We received a report that a large dog barks at people and tries to climb out of a window each time someone walks past. This is quite a concern as it is a relatively busy footpath. The matter has been past to the Environmental Officers as this has some history behind it

We received a report of toxic smelling smoke at the Old Portfield Football Club site. When we arrived, there was smoke coming from the derelict changing rooms. Someone had broken into the premises, set up a tent inside and lit a fire, which had filled the rooms with acrid smoke. There was no response from inside, and not knowing if anyone was inside, we called the Fire and Rescue Service. Two appliances attended and they searched the premises, fortunately no one was inside. Estates were informed to secure the property. The Outreach Officer was informed.

We have spent time a fair amount of time patrolling Graylingwell after seeing some suspicious activities, possibly drug dealing.

One or two incidents of ASB reported on the Whyke Estate, some of the young people involved are already known to us.

When patrolling in Swanfield Park we reported a property that the front garden was near overflowing with rubbish and furniture, posing a potential Fire/Health risk. We haven't received a reply yet.

Large amounts of fly tipping throughout both the areas ranging from Rubble and timber to Pallets.

A complaint re dog waste being left on the ground in Arundel Park, a lack of bins in the area is a problem.

We received a report of damage/Vandalism in a Play Park. The Police were involved, and Hyde quickly cleared the area of debris.

A talk about our work to a group at St Georges Church in Whyke was well received and we will be attending whenever they have a community event in future.

General patrols continue.

- Attended other miscellaneous incidents 215






- Ambassadors are now out in the city for 5 x 6 hour shifts a week, as opposed to 3 shifts a week. This has been funded from the UK SPF fund and Chichester BID revenue budget. This change to the work pattern commenced 11th November 2024 and will continue until the end of March 2025. Budgets will be reviewed again at this point to see if this extended service can be continued, as there is a definite need for this increased coverage.
- We have recruited a new Ambassador, Jack, to work alongside the current team. We have done this as we wish to provide a more consistent service over annual leave breaks and also to look at extending hours into the early evening economy (5pm 8pm).
- During January 2025, the team spent time patrolling with the new CDC Community Warden, establishing this new and important new relationship.


Examples of type of support given during this period:

- 1. Attending sites where beggar harassment has been an issue and referring individuals to Stone Pillow.
- 2. Administering First Aid to pavement fall injuries.
- 3. Illegal traffic redirection in the precinct.
- 4. Recovery of stolen goods from retail theft.
- 5. Particular support for M and S in their vulnerable alcohol aisle over Christmas period.
- 6. Offering support for visitor who was having a dementia episode.
- 7. Supporting shops with gangs of intimidating behaviour from local young people.
- 8. Continued regular attendance at key theft and ASB hot spots Co Op East Street, TKMaxx, M and S (both sites), Tesco Express, Sports Direct, H and M, New Look and Eastgate Square.
- 9. Supporting Chichester BID's and the wider city's Christmas activities
- 10. Replenishing of 45 car park map dispensers regularly

Programme of Events 2024 - 2025

For our Christmas celebration, Bertie Pearce visited to give an illustrated talk about *Commedia dell'arte:* the magic of improvised Italian theatre. The issue with the electricity supply in North Street during December meant that we had to change venue at short notice! Fortunately Chichester Baptist Church in Parklands generously provided us with accommodation and technical support so that the evening ran very smoothly.

In January we hosted a Zoom talk by author and reporter Colin O'Brien who spoke about the Giro d'Italia - the most beautiful bike race - the title of his book. It was fascinating to hear how this sporting event at its inception had aided the unification of Italy! We enjoyed hearing anecdotes about various famous "cycling personalities" and he helped us understand why this event holds such a very special place in every Italian's heart!

Our February event featured a musical evening. The students from Chichester University who had performed in the exchange summer concerts in Ravenna in 2024 came back and presented the same programme. We had a wonderful evening.

Other evening events to come in the next 3 months: we will focus learning on how the Medici family bankrolled the Renaisance, the making of the famous Stradivarius violins and that very curious man, Leonardo da Vinci! We have an evening booked at Chichester Cinema @ New Park in June when we will learn about an aspect of Italian film-making.

The Ravennati visit in 2025

This will take place 25-29 June. It is hoped that the Mayoral Reception can take place late afternoon / early evening of the day they arrive.

Music Exchange 2025

Report to: Chichester City Council - Community Affairs

for its Meeting on Monday 3rd March 2025

From: Paula Chatfield, Chair of Chichester Tree Wardens

Date: 23rd February 2025

Since we last reported (24th November 2024), Chichester Tree Wardens' volunteer activities to promote trees and encourage protection of and planting trees include:

- Working up 3 events for entry into the Festival of Chichester:
 - Wednesday 25th June: Day of Discovery at Brandy Hole Copse (event by the Friends of Brandy Hole Copse, supported by Ray and me);
 - Wednesday 9th July: Explore Trees at Jubilee Gardens (sponsored by Chichester Quakers);
 - Tuesday 15th July: Discover Community Orchards, at Oaklands Park (joint event with Transition Town Chichester).

We have been really pleased with our partnership working, giving us the confidence to submit these entries by the 31st January deadline. There is quite a lot of legwork to do before the Festival launch at the start of April; and more nearer the time to ensure all volunteers and guests have worthwhile experiences.

- Work has started on our new **Chichester City Centre Tree Trail**, intended for publication in 2026, subject to funding.
- We have been successful in requesting almost 1,600 baby trees ("whips") as a last-minute application to the Woodland Trust's "Free Trees for Schools and Communities" scheme. The Trust found itself with excess tree stock and I spent a bizarre week in January contacting different people to see what might be possible. With Hyde's permission, we will be co-ordinating volunteers to plant some new hedgerow beside the bunds at the western end of the greenspace at the top of Sherborne Road. I think we have a sensible scheme that enhances the space for both people and wildlife, whilst keeping footways and views clear and minimising future maintenance costs. Tree delivery is expected by 7th March and planting will take place as soon as possible after that. We'll let you know how we get on.
- We've been really heartened by communication with our WSCC highway tree officer recently. He
 has let us know of some tree fellings in advance (including the emergency felling of one of the
 false acacias on East Street at the junction of St Martin's Lane on New Year's Eve) and will let us
 have a list of the new street trees planted this year, when planting is complete (some planting has
 been delayed due to a backlog in stump removal).
- It has been good too to liaise briefly with CCC on your application to CDC for funding 2 community
 orchards at the Little Breach allotments and The Brewery Field, and in relation to the first Junior
 Mayor tree planting following Geoff King's retirement from tree wardening.

If any Councillors would like us to visit their patch with them to look at and talk about trees, please do get in touch.

CHICHESTER CITY COUNCIL Chichester Cemetery

INTRODUCTION

The City Council contribute 50% towards the net cost of running the Chichester Cemetery. Chichester District Council operate the service and provide the City Council with quarterly monitoring statements, these are followed up by a quarterly invoice. There is currently a Memorandum of Understanding between the District Council and the City Council which was signed in January 2024 for a period 5 years which explains the terms and conditions of the agreement.

BACKGROUND

It is estimated that the Cemetery may run out of land for burials and interments in the next 5 years. So alternative provision, other than using the Petworth Cemetery, may need to be considered.

The estimated expenditure per annum to run the Chichester Cemetery (2024-2025) is £142,000 and the Income £88,000, net cost £42,000, which is split between CCC and CDC.

In 2024-2025 there were 32 burials of which 16 were Chichester City residents and 15 interments of which 9 were Chichester City residents.

Staffing

There are two FTE grounds operatives, dedicated to Chi cemetery.

Charges

The Memorandum of Understanding details that while the percentage of Chichester City residents' burials at the cemetery, falls between 45% and 65% residents are be entitled to a 50% discount.

Given the competing needs and opportunities for supporting other community organisations the Committee will want to consider the value for money of the current service. Current total cost £42,000. Consideration might be given to ways to ensure that the service breaks even.

One possibility might be to remove the 50% discount for City residents, which might give an additional income £29,333 or reviewing the current charges (see list attached).

Conclusion

Future consideration needs to be given when producing the budget for 2026-2027 to the provision of the service and its costs.
