Thank you for your continued support, helping to fund our Counselling and emotional support service with a grant of £5,000 over 3 year, with this last payment being the final payment of this agreement.

We have 27 young people are waiting to start counselling and 16 are waiting for assessment. However, these young people can access emotional support and wellbeing activities in the meantime, as part of the support pathway.

What we offered

- **A Drop-In Emotional Support Service** operating five days a week (30 mins sessions via 2 staff and 14 Emotional Support Volunteers) which enables young people aged 11-25 to access:
 - **IMMEDIATE** Emotional Support
 - Advice and Guidance
 - 3 hours a week was also offered in Bognor Regis and Littlehampton at pop up shops, funded by Million Hours Fund
- **A Counselling Service** free by appointment (run by 22 Volunteers), supported by assessment and clinical supervisors who have both qualifications in working with young people and are qualified clinical supervisors. Our Counselling service operates over five weekdays. This service is free for young people, and it offers up to 6 months' Counselling, with the ability to extend this up to two years if required. Some choose to move up to Counselling after receiving Emotional support sessions and some move back to Emotional Support services as they gain confidence and emotional strength.
- **Wellbeing Activities/Workshops** offered weekly to support the waiting list for the Counselling/ Emotional Support, led by the Outreach Youth Officer and external providers. These workshops provided a safe and welcoming environment where young people can unleash their creativity, take part in physical activities, create new friendships, and confidentially speak with someone they trust if required. Wellbeing and outreach services have supported over 97 activities and interactions with 1,190 YP (Majority of YP from Chichester). Some were one off session themes like an arts and craft sessions and some were a series of sessions such as Boxing and Yoga. These included: Bishop Luffa Outreach session, Bognor job centre outreach session, Chi college-foundation programme, Christmas workshops, Crochet club, Diamond art painting, Girls Fit box, Goodwood activity day, Job Fair, Sailing, Self-soothe box, Skateboarding workshop series(3), Yoga at The Shed (14) and at Bourne Community College (2).

Reasons for coming to YPS

- We have seen a rise in coming to us for support because of Low Wellbeing (predominately anxiety)- from 22% to 30%
- We have seen a rise in YP coming to us for support because of Life skills- school, exam stress, jobs, money from 18% to 22%
- We have seen a rise in coming to us for support because of Self harming from 4 -5% this year seeing over 162 YP.

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Feedback from beneficiary surveys captured that-

- 81% said - more confident after visiting YPS
- 79% said - self-esteem has improved after visiting YPS
- 70% said - anxiety levels have reduced after visiting YPS
- 57% said - relationships and socialising have improved since using our services/support

'I like having a space to talk and feeling heard. I feel like I didn't have to wait too long to receive help and I like how its a bit more longer term then other services. I like the flexibility of teams and face to face sessions; I like having those options available.'

'I was extremely grateful that this service was available free of cost, especially when any sort of counselling and/or therapy can be expensive. I found it very beneficial and my counsellor extended our sessions when I felt that I needed the continued support.'

'It seems like you guys are making the most efficient use of the resources you have available; I have no complaints. This service has been really useful to me as-is, and the fact that you're able to accommodate people being regularly late or occasionally missing sessions has made it accessible to me in a way that most similar resources aren't, so that's probably the thing that's most useful to me from a practical perspective. All the volunteers and counsellors I've met have also been lovely people but that probably goes without saying :D

'My experience with the YPS (Chichester) has been truly life changing. As a 25-year-old previously thinking "I should have everything together by now" but still suppressing feelings from past experiences, I have since learnt it is so important to feel everything.

YPS helped me with allotting time for myself, to be calm, reflect and feel with no judgement and most impactful for me, validation. The wonderful staff of YPS are so accommodating to help find the right counsellor for you. Working with people who can really understand your story and guide you in the right direction.

Therapy/counselling isn't magic, everything won't change overnight. However, I do believe it is like gold dust, that makes the hard work more manageable and a stepping stone to the 'light at the end of the tunnel'.



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'The people here are great, and they've been an amazing resource for getting through health problems and recovery and working out how to shoulder all the organisational challenges of accessing medical care as a young adult, as well as the more typical struggles I've had with mental health. I have no idea how I would have gotten through this process without them.'

Case Study 1

Preferred gender / ethnic background / age Female / White British / 18				
Background: Living at home with mother, father and five siblings. Supportive friendship group. Not currently in education or working.				
Young person's concerns: Agoraphobia for five years. Daily anxiety with panic attacks. Struggles to leave the house alone. Low self-esteem. Feels "suffocated" in family home. Wants to be independent and have more freedom.				
Support offered: 1-2-1 weekly counselling sessions over 6 months. A combination of in-person, phone and walk & talk therapy, supporting client's autonomy and reflexive to changing needs. Person-centred therapeutic approach, offering a non-judgemental, brave space. Using creative resources to explore aspects of self and express thoughts and feelings (i.e working with emotions cards; and nature cards linking to client's interests). Exploring self-regulation techniques.				
Outcomes: Self-esteem and confidence improved. Client moved towards an internal locus of evaluation trusting in herself, her choices and decisions. Anxiety and panic attacks decreased. Client felt more able to organise activities outside of home, including starting to plan and take journeys, which, 6 months later, led to planning and embarking on work experience living away from home.

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Case Study 2 - Outreach Wellbeing

YPS delivered a welcoming and inclusive drop-in skateboarding session at Westgate Skatepark this morning, creating a relaxed space where young people aged 11–25 from a range of backgrounds could come. The session began at a gentle pace with two young people who were confident on their scooters but hesitant to try skateboarding. With encouragement and support from Dale at South Coast Skate Club, they quickly grew in confidence. By the end of the session, they were riding down ramps and even attempting their first “ollie.” Both left feeling inspired and expressed an interest in getting their own skateboards.

As the morning progressed, a group of young people from the local travelling community joined in. It was fantastic to see them engaging with the session, borrowing boards and helmets and trying skateboarding for the first time. The session provided a safe, supportive, and culturally inclusive environment where everyone felt welcome to participate, build confidence, and learn new skills together. Overall, the session was a really positive example of how inclusive youth provision can bring together diverse groups of young people, fostering confidence, connection, and shared experiences.



The Future 26-27

We start the new year, with services in full flow. We plan no new work this year, but to make sure the vital services that we offer remain in place for all those YP that are using them, and that will need them.

We have secured part funding of £13,333 toward the lead Counsellor role from the National Lottery for the next two years, which is great news. Also, the Outreach and Wellbeing services are funded for the whole year and 50% of all key service deliver staff roles from National Lottery. With other restricted funding, means we have secured over £156,000 towards an estimated £300,000 budget.

PACSO Annual Report - Core Cost Funding £5,000

PACSO is a Chichester-based charity that supports families and provides vital respite to parents and carers. We provide play and social opportunities for children and young people aged 0–25 who have special educational needs, disabilities, behavioural challenges, or complex health needs that prevent them from accessing mainstream services.

From PACSO's humble beginnings on the back of an envelope, the organisation has grown to become one of the largest providers of respite care in West Sussex.

Our activities are fully inclusive and accessible, ensuring children and young people can enjoy opportunities for leisure, friendships, and experiences that support overall wellbeing. PACSO helps families feel less isolated by providing respite, ongoing support, and opportunities for children to build confidence, independence and meaningful connections within the community.

What the Grant has Supported

PACSO is extremely grateful for the £5,000 grant provided by Chichester City Council towards our core costs, which have enabled us to maintain and continue delivering our services to children, young people, and families across the local community.

Core costs play an important part of keeping a charity functioning efficiently and effectively, whilst ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all PACSO members, staff, and volunteers. Although these costs are often less visible than frontline delivery, they are essential to ensuring that services can operate safely, professionally, and sustainably.

Your grant contributed towards vital organisational costs which include:

- Staffing and administration
- Rent and utility costs
- Insurance and safeguarding requirements
- Professional fees and compliance
- Essential operational and infrastructure costs
- Without support towards these core costs, it would not be possible to continue delivering our frontline respite and play to the high standard that families rely upon.

Without support towards these core costs, it would not be possible to continue delivering respite, play and social opportunities to the high standards that our families rely upon. The grant from Chichester City Council has therefore played an important role in helping PACSO maintain stability and continue supporting local families who rely on our services.

During the reporting period, PACSO delivered a wide range of sessions and activities designed to promote confidence, independence, social interaction, and wellbeing.

Our children and young people experienced a wide variety of enrichment activities, including messy play, art, sensory seeking activities, go-karts and trampolining, Forest Schools, park and play outings, swimming, CYE and Go Active. These activities help PACSO meet the diverse needs of the children and young people that we support, ensuring that activities remain engaging, inclusive, and accessible to all.

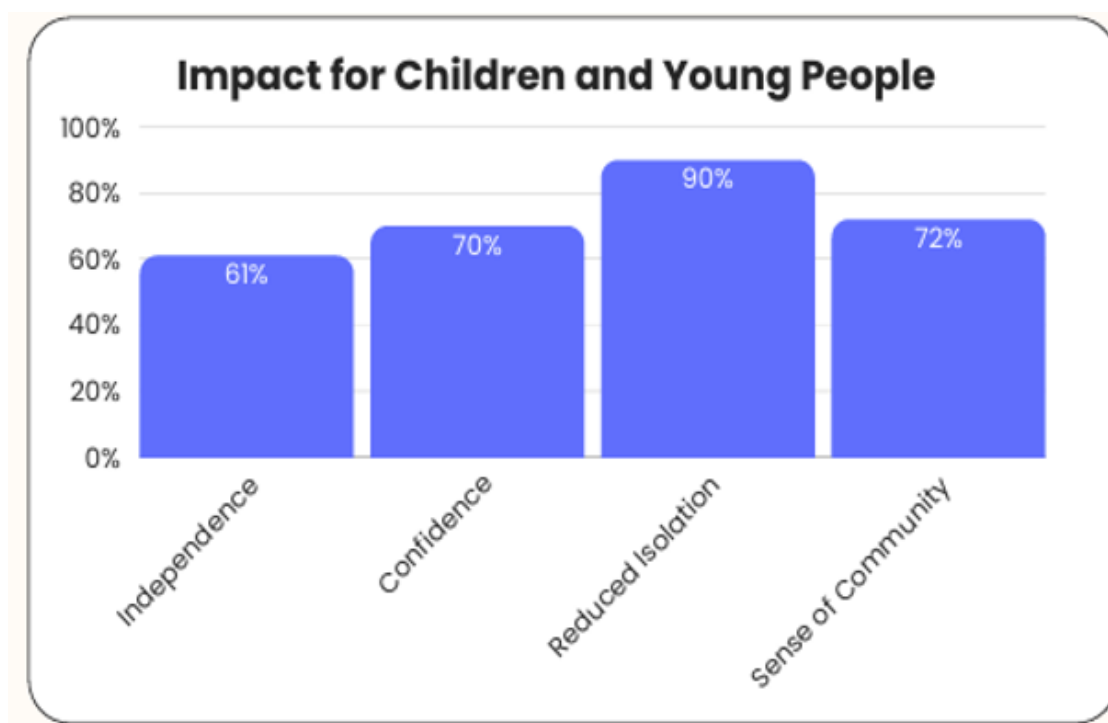
Outcomes Achieved

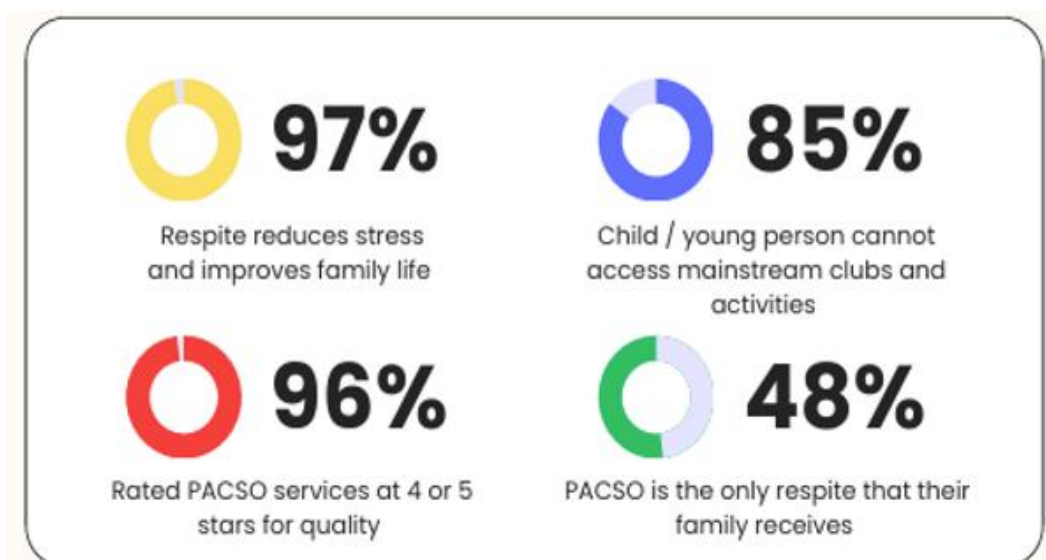
Throughout the year, PACSO delivered:

- **8,234** hours of respite support
- **4,763** places filled
- Support to **233** different children and young people

The table below shows the impact results from our most recent parent and carer survey and demonstrates the positive difference that PACSO continues to make to children, young people, and families accessing our services.

The feedback highlights the importance of respite opportunities, and the wider emotional and social benefits experienced by families through their involvement with PACSO.





The following comments from parents and carers demonstrate the positive impact that PACSO continues to have on children, young people, and families accessing our services:

“PACSO has supported our son since he was a toddler. Now as a young man in his 20’s it continues to be an important part of his life.”

“PACSO is the only thing my daughter does without us, apart from school, and it’s been huge for her confidence and independence. She feels part of a community outside of her family and school which is so important for her wellbeing.”

“PACSO has been fantastic for my son. He is not able to attend any mainstream after school clubs or holiday clubs, so PACSO is our only option. Luckily PACSO provide so much care and fun and he always enjoys his time there. Thank you PACSO.”

“Thank you. Year after year my daughter thrives with the support from PACSO. We couldn’t imagine life without you.”

Challenges

We continue to experience increasing demand for spaces across our services, alongside a significant rise in the level of care and support required by the children and young people attending our activities.

For the reported period, **57% of the children and young people that attended PACSO activities required 1:1 support**. This reflects the increasingly complex needs of those attending PACSO activities, including significant disabilities, behavioural challenges, communication difficulties, and complex health needs.

Providing this level of inclusive support requires significant staffing, training, safeguarding, and operational resources. The continued rise in complex care needs further highlights the importance of sustainable funding to ensure that PACSO can maintain safe staffing ratios, high-quality support, and accessible opportunities for all children and young people attending our services.

The year has highlighted the continued importance of:

- Accessible local respite provision
- Early support for families
- Community inclusion for children and young people with additional needs
- Sustainable funding for specialist services

- Appoint a Fundraising Assistant to support the Fundraising Manager, and to develop our community fundraising activities and raise PACSO's profile locally

800th Anniversary Report

1st to 17th September 2026

Purpose of Report

This report has been prepared to provide Councillors with an overview of the proposed programme of activities and events taking place between 1 and 17 September 2026 as part of the celebrations marking the 800th Anniversary of Chichester City Council.

Overview

The anniversary programme has been designed to celebrate the history, heritage and civic traditions of Chichester City Council while encouraging participation from residents, schools, community groups and visitors. Activities will include talks, exhibitions, processions, educational workshops, heritage tours and public celebrations centered around the historic Cross and Guildhall.

2nd- 3rd September 2026 – Historical Talks Programme

A series of public talks will take place on 2 and 3 September 2026.

Alan Green will deliver a presentation on the History of the Corporation, while Anne Scicluna and Rodney Duggua will provide talks relating to the history and development of Chichester City Council. These sessions are intended to increase public understanding of the Council's historic role and civic development.

5th September 2026 – Proclamation and Medieval Celebration

The principal civic celebration will take place on 5 September 2026.

The day will include a Medieval Market beneath the Cross featuring historical displays, activities, such as Archery, armour making, other crafts and Medieval characters and stalls selling themed items such as bread, biscuits, juices and honey. Consideration is also being given to the sale of replica swords and shields in keeping with the historical significance of the site, which operated as a market until 1808.

Educational information leaflets explaining the history of the Cross will be distributed to visitors throughout the day.

Children's lantern-making workshops are also proposed during the daytime, culminating in a procession from the Guildhall to the Cross.

Councillors will attend the formal Proclamation in robes and participate in the civic procession. A medieval actor will deliver the Proclamation speech, drafted with support from Alan Green. The Dean will be invited to provide a blessing of the Cross as part of the ceremony.

The Town Crier will assist with public announcements during the day, excluding periods when the formal procession and Proclamation are taking place.

13th September 2026 – Heritage Open Day

As part of Heritage Open Days, the Council building will be opened to members of the public on 13 September 2026.

Visitors will be offered guided tours of the Council Chamber and Mayor's Parlour. Councillors will be invited to assist with the tours, and training arrangements will be coordinated in advance to support participation.

Exhibition Programme

An exhibition of historical documents and artefacts will be arranged as part of the anniversary celebrations. Officers will work with Alan Green to identify suitable materials for display.

The exhibition name is 'Mayors, Maces and Municipality', focusing on the civic traditions, historic regalia and development of local government within Chichester.

Councillor Participation

Councillors are encouraged to support the anniversary programme by attending events, participating in the civic procession, assisting with Heritage Open Day tours and promoting the celebrations within the community.

Further operational details, including timings, responsibilities and ceremonial arrangements, will be circulated closer to the event dates.

Conclusion

The 800th Anniversary programme represents an important opportunity to celebrate the rich civic heritage of Chichester City Council and to engage residents and visitors in the history of the city. The programme between 1 and 17 September 2026 will combine education, ceremony and community participation to mark this significant milestone.
